I am delighted to present this Annual Governors Report. Throughout this past year, whatever was thrown at us, whatever problem we encountered, as a whole College, JCG and JCP, we solved, re-engineered, re-imagined and kept going. We believed we can when Covid was telling us all we couldn't. The entire Governing Body and I, would like to thank the College, its leadership, staff, students and parents for remaining focused on doing our very best for our students.

Last year was our 140th anniversary. Throughout its long history, the College has shown its courage not only in facing new ways of doing things but also in calling out and combating injustice, prejudice and social ills. We are an activist college and in whatever we do, we seek to develop ourselves to make the world better. Each month we learnt about and

celebrated remarkable alumnae: Adelaide Casely-Hayford, Lillian Grandin, Majorie Blandy, Vivienne Mylne, Sally Le Brocq, Dame Florence Baron, Jane Delap, Leanne Christmas and Jude Terry who this May became the first female Rear Admiral in the Royal Navy showing yet again the ceilings still needing to be broken.



## The Governors Report



From the vision of Elsie Roberts, our founding Principal, whose portrait by John Helier Lander was restored this year, this College continues to work in close partnership with our incredible students and pupils so that they thrive in whatever endeavour they take and in doing so help others to thrive too. This culture is what is depicted in the specially commissioned piece by Rory McCann. Our birthday was marked by a very special service and the unveiling of a plaque at the St. Helier Methodist Centre, the birthplace of the idea which has subsequently become Jersey College itself. We are grateful to the St. Helier Methodist centre and especially Rev Tony Morling for the donation of a prize in recognition.

Our 140th Anniversary was also a perfect year to launch our strategy for the next four years. We remain guided by the important collection of our ambitious intent. Our strategy was launched by Karen Rankine, our outgoing Chair of Governors. The whole College expressed its deep gratitude to Karen for her enduring care, expertise and wisdom throughout her long association with the College.

The ingenuity shown throughout these past twelve months has been inspiring. The Forget Me Knot project, launched by JCG enabled 2300 students from across Jersey to make beautiful blue flowers which came together to form a stunning art installation at the Jersey Museum. This project was borne out of a desire for our community to reflect on our feelings and those of others as we began to make sense of a very difficult and frightening time. It then evolved into the design and production of beautiful jewellery sold to raise funds for Jersey Action against Rape. Our sixth form made and sold Christmas hampers for the Stroke Association, the ever-successful Cavell Auction moved online, we made and sold scrumptious soup at the Shelter Trust Soup Kitchen, we designed, made and modelled sustainable fashion, we showed our gratitude to the Hospital and all health staff with posters for display throughout their buildings, we sent more shoeboxes to Romania than ever before, our students led the campaign in wearing reusable masks and we marked Holocaust day with messages of hope painted onto stones and left throughout the island. Our

Foundation launched Creative Minds, a Saturday and Holiday Programme for all primary students to learn about Science Robotics and Creativity.

We learnt how to learn differently, and in doing so, no learning was lost and we only progressed. Blended learning became the norm, not being here stopped being an obstacle to being in class. Assemblies went online as did parent evenings. Instead of the whiz, bang, buzz of our Open Days, we moved to tea and tours where small groups of parents and students were given a bespoke personal tour by a prefect followed by afternoon tea – again this will stay. We launched College Café online to allow the community to see the fantastic creativity and talent here, we created Live Lounge for our singers to record and perform again online and we kept adding to JCG TV, our Youtube channel, something which has become a jewelled treasure box of memories.

The strength of resilience and determination was most keenly shown in how our staff and students at JCG responded to the new assessment format for GCSEs and A levels. While the destination remained the same, the path to get there was different. It was so wonderful to celebrate the success of our students in the Summer and the depth of academic excellence was evident. The average grade at A level was AAA with 67% of all grades being awarded A\* or A. Our GCSEs were no less incredible with the average grade being 5 x Grade 8 and 5 x Grade 7. 80% of all grades were at the very highest band of Grades 9 – 7. This is evidence not just of ability but what is achieved when we work in such close partnership, caring, support and belief. The destination of our Year 13 and the array of courses and choices is compelling and fills me full of hope and optimism by what these remarkable people will achieve and make better. At JCP the dedication of staff, parents and pupils and their commitment during lockdown in the spring and summer months of 2020 ensured that little deep learning was lost and any gaps have already been filled. This was recognised and celebrated in a recent external review by an independent UK Ofsted inspector.



Recognising what the world is and dreaming about what it could be is what we do. We responded to the call of Black Lives Matter with great focus and determination to eradicate prejudice, we campaigned to eliminate Period Poverty and, in the wake of the tragic murder of Sarah Everard, our JCG students courageously gave testimonies of sexual harassment and exposed a culture we must change. We are inspired and indebted to them in doing so and leading the path of change we are now on. I am also appreciative of the partnership with Victoria College as we walk this path together.

Looking forward, we continue to invest in our campus and resources. We are excited to have secured the funding to build our new Music Centre, the field east of JCP is to be redesignated as an educational amenity in the new Island Bridging Plan and thus enabling our students and pupils to enjoy much needed space. We have invested

significantly in technology, using what we have learnt throughout the pandemic to be a platform to greater things. All Year 7s will be accessing much of their learning through iPads thus enabling us to utilise the powers of artificial intelligence in assessing their learning and creating bespoke programmes as well as reducing the use of paper in our quest to be carbon neutral by 2030. And that is what we are about – doing the best for our students so that they do their best for our world.

I thank Carl and Richard and their leadership teams, all our staff, students, fellow Governors and parents for your support, encouragement and perseverance. While this past year has, at times, been tricky, confusing and different, the Governing Body is so proud of everyone in our College family for how they have come together, united, full of love and care and determined to thrive.

# Competitions

During the year, JCG students entered competitions covering a wide range of curriculum areas. Here are some highlights:

## English

Winning entries have included first place in the Junior Category of Jersey Festival of Words (Evie MacDonald), first place in the GSA Writing Competition for KS3/4 (Harriet Palfreyman) and second place for KS5 (Naomi Balderson), a large number of winners in the Commonwealth Essay Competition, first place in the International Never Such Innocence Competition 11-14 category (Tilly Dhami – Hounsoume). The House Poetry Competition was also re-established and received over 60 entries.

## Modern Languages

Jessica Palfreyman and Aisling O'Sullivan entered the Lancaster University Modern Languages Competition and were shortlisted for their video entry entitled 'Why learn languages in the age of Google Translate'. They also both produced exceptional entries for the Oxford University Flash Fiction competition. With the cancellation of the Modern Languages Eisteddfod last year, we ran our first ever House Languages competition, with participants reciting a poem in French, Italian or Spanish.

## Maths

In the highly competitive Southampton Maths Challenge, Lucy Collard won a Certificate of Merit. There were 4 Gold Certificate winners in the Junior Maths Challenge: Emily Wery, Sophie Hall, Auden Ruelle and Sophie Pirouet. In the Intermediate Maths Challenge, Ella Stegenwalner achieved a Gold Certificate and entered the very challenging Intermediate Maths Olympiad, achieving a

very creditable score. A further 5 students Sienna Jehan, Aarya Patil, Kate Dennison-Herbert, Imogen Mitchell and Saesha Chohan all achieved Silver Certificates. In the Senior Maths Challenge, Nikita Handel won a Gold Certificate and our 6 Silver Certificate winners were Amber Wagg, Isabella Birtwistle, Bethany Freeman, Anna Edelenbos, Shelly Xiao and Ella Stegenwalner.



## Science

Two students entered the Chemistry Olympiad. Kaitlyn Gilbert achieved bronze and Abigail Lander achieved silver. Year 10 took part in a trail Science competition organised by the Universities of Bristol, Manchester, Newcastle, Southampton and Warwick. The competition was designed to assess scientific thinking rather than understanding of taught material. Students performed very well against over 1000 students from other schools.

## Art and Photography

### House Art

All houses rose to the challenge, producing a vibrant and varied display of work in many different styles and techniques, including photography, textiles, collage, mixed media relief, printmaking as well as the more traditional paintings and drawings. It was judged this year by two Heads of Art from local secondary schools, who were hugely impressed by the range of talent on show. It was close, but best display award went to Austen-Bartlett, and the best individual piece was judged to be Hannah George's study of her grandmother from Nightingale's display.

### Photography Covid challenge

This was an initiative devised by Mrs Padidar during the first lockdown that invited all students in every year to respond to a series of starting points like 'Home', 'Something I value', 'Morning'. The idea was to supplement students' creative education by encouraging them to

reflect on the important aspects of their lives whilst composing some superb, effective imagery. It proved very popular. The results were stunning and we had the best images collaged together and printed professionally by SignTech on large-scale boards which were then exhibited in school.

### Joint exhibition Art and Textiles:

Year 12 students in both these subjects had both completed modules of work inspired by natural forms, so we thought it a good idea to exhibit the work side-by-side to illustrate the 'joined-up' thinking that is practiced in the Creative Faculty. We alternated very large mixed-media artworks based on studies of flora and foliage at Samares Manor with tessellated (repeating) textile patterns developed from similar starting points. The results were really eye-catching.

## Textiles

### House Fashion

10-15 students from each House and all years take part in this fantastic event and have the opportunity to create a collection of wearable art pieces which is inspired by their own theme. Each house has six weeks to create this body of work using up-cycled items, creative textile techniques and adornment to produce exciting wears.

These collections are judged by professional people in the fashion and textile industry on the night of the show. This year the prize for the best collection went to Austen Bartlett, the senior prize was awarded to Alice Le Chevalier, the junior to Ava Le Cornu and the designer with the most potential was Phoebe Ashton-Barnett.

JCG House Fashion Show was a huge success. Overall, 60 students took part, putting huge amounts of time

and effort into each collection and showcasing creative talent. The event was attended by about 180 supporters.

### Young Designer Competition

Established in 2010, Young Fashion Designer UK is an exciting national competition which focuses on enhancing the talent of students to showcase and promote the exceptional work achieved at GCSE, A Level and by students aged 11-14 studying textiles design, product design and fashion throughout the United Kingdom. Ava Le Cornu, Tabitha Torrell and Ava Morgan were highly commended.

We are delighted to share that Annabel Dent was placed 3rd in the UK in the National Young Fashion Designers Competition. The brief was to design their own 'Athleisure' Collection with sustainability in mind.

### The Rematch

With the girls dominating the result in the first Us v Them netball match, the boys requested a rematch. This was played in March at the end of the Spring Term. The game was well contested throughout with the score line being goal for goal. The boys showed perseverance whilst the girls kept calm and composed throughout. In the final quarter, the girls made a strong comeback with interceptions and turnovers which meant the score was 13-13 on the final whistle.

To add atmosphere for the spectators, Kirsty and Bobby (captains) deliberated with Mr Howarth and Mr Hughes, who agreed that an extra 2 minutes was to be played. The boys led with one goal and possessional play which was impressive.

### The PE 140 Challenge

Jersey College for Girls celebrated its 140th Anniversary this year and the PE Department created a 140 kilometre challenge. Students, staff and the wider community encouraged the College community to complete 140



kilometres within 6 weeks. The overall student achievement was awarded to Libby, Year 10, who exceeded the target and more by swimming, cycling and running.

### Sports Ambassadors

## PE

### The Leadership Programme

Students who applied for the role of Sports Ambassadors were offered the opportunity to take part in a JCG Sports Leadership programme which ran from October 2020 to March 2021. Abigail, Sports Captain 2020 - 2021, worked alongside Miss Carré to deliver an in depth and engaging curriculum which would help students develop as volunteers or leaders in their chosen sport(s). After the course was completed, Year 8 and 9 students led several sessions for students at Jersey College Prep where students acted as role models and delivered rounders and athletics sessions to younger students.



### Find Love in February Challenge

Find Love in February was a venture run by Midnight Industries (James) who placed 12 hearts around the Island

in the hope that during the pandemic Islanders would 'get out and find love' with their friends and families and enjoy the beautiful scenery that Jersey has. The PE Department set a challenge for staff and students to find the original 12 hearts placed in different parishes around the island. Students, staff and the wider JCG community took part with the overall winners being Sixth Form students Roseanna and Erin.

Alongside the 'Find Love' in February Challenge, in conjunction with Midnight Industries, Sports Captains and Sports Ambassadors created various workouts to take part in over February half term.

### PE Easter Challenge – March

The PE Department helped by the Student Sports Ambassador team, placed egg templates around the College grounds in an attempt to encourage student activity during the school day, break and lunchtimes. This linked with Mr McGarva's initiative of #lookup to encourage students to take a break from their screen. When students found an egg template, they exchanged this for an Easter treat. This was well received by students across all age groups and was an active and 'eggiting' way to finish the Spring Term.

### House competitions

Miss Lovell, along with the help of House Captains, ran several House sporting events, despite Covid-19 restrictions, across different sports, which encourage competition and participation in both the lower and upper school.

House table tennis, badminton, rounders, tennis and 5-a-side football were completed across the year which encouraged House spirit despite the events being run in year groups. It was excellent to see House Captains working with younger year groups and demonstrating house spirit in all sporting aspects.

## Drama

### Year 7 Drama Club

In the absence of a whole school production, the Drama Captains set up a very well attended Drama Club that ran across the academic year for Year 7 students. They met every week and produced short performance pieces, some of which were shared on JCG TV via the College Café. This was an excellent creative outlet for Year 7.

### College Café

Our Drama Captain, Jemima Porter, came up with the idea of the College Café. It was run by Mr Bowley (assisted by Jemima, Drama staff and Mr Crespel) and was an excellent way to showcase performances across the year. We used the College Café to share Year 7 Drama Club work, some curriculum performances and LAMDA duologues and solo acting pieces.

### LAMDA

We succeeded in gaining Distinctions for all Year 7 and 8 students who studied for LAMDA Acting grades in 2020/21. Students were hugely professional when told they needed to change their acting pieces from Combined (monologue / duologue) to Solo Acting (two monologues). This was due to the online assessment of the grades by LAMDA examiners instead of the usual live visit. They worked really hard with their teachers to perfect their solo pieces and did themselves proud in the exams when faced with a computer screen as their audience.

### House Drama and House Top of the Pops 2020/21

We worked closely with the Head of House and House Captains to ensure every year group could be included in some way or other in these two competitions. We felt it was very important to give Years 8 and above the chance to shine. It was agreed that Year 8, Year 10 and Year 11 would participate in House Drama. The juniors (Year 8) acted duologues, the seniors (Year 10) could offer either duologues or solo pieces and finally the Spontaneous Improvisation class was given to Year 11. It was a great event, taking place across three lunchtimes in November. Top of the Pops was a recorded event and was the turn of Year 9 (Junior TOTP) and Year 12 and 13 (Senior TOTP) to perform. The recorded event was shown to the whole school in the final assembly before Christmas and then again via JCG TV.

### Channel 4 National Junior Bake Off Competition 2021

Three students Lucia May, Emily Robertson and Millie Dobson all entered into the Junior National Great British Bake-Off. This is a spin off from the popular adult television baking competition in which young bakers aged 9 to 15 tackle a series of challenges involving baking cakes, biscuits, bread, and pastries. Students compete to be crowned Junior Bake-Off Champion. The afore-mentioned students have uploaded a portfolio of evidence and we are waiting to hear if they will be shortlisted for 2022 following disruptions due to Covid-19 in 2021.

# Prizegiving

We were delighted to once again host our 2021 Prize Giving Ceremony in the presence of our prize winners and their families, His Excellency Sir Stephen Dalton and Lady Dalton.

Susie Richardson, Governor of the States of Jersey Prison Service, presented the prizes and gave a superb explanation of how her career developed, to inspire our students; "The goal is to make gender insignificant... we should never apologise or compromise ourselves in any situation for being a woman. Neither do we need to compete with or repress men or anyone else. The goal isn't for women to dominate, it is for equality. We want to be remembered for being authentic, true to who we are; for how we treated people, to be measured by the outcome we achieve in our professions".

Carl Howarth, Principal, touched upon the year before, a second school year that felt the keen impact of Covid-19, "The ingenuity shown throughout these past 12 months has been inspiring. Our students have embraced this new online education, and not just in the learning sense. They moved their physical House events online raising thousands of pounds for their House charities, worked independently and in their bubbles to support art events such as the Forget-Me-Knot installation at the Maritime Museum, and to create thank you posters for our brilliant hospital staff. Our students found that friendships and classroom comradery does translate through a screen."

"This year's Prize Winners are a special group. Not only did they go above and beyond to be awarded their prize, they did so at a time when we were still unsure of what every day would bring. What a very, very special group they are."
