Annual Governors' Report

I am delighted to present this Annual Governors Report and thank the Governing Body, the College's leadership, our staff, parents and students for their unending determination and passion to provide the very best for our young people throughout this past year.

The abiding theme at the beginning of last academic year was getting back to something resembling normality. We have been determined to persist and adapt so that our students and staff receive the true JCG and JCP experience, or as close as we could get to it at that time. We are very aware that for our students, each year is their only year; you are only in Reception once, in Year 7 once and Year 13 is your final experience of the many aspects that make our JCG and JCP family. We owe our students nothing less than our best so we were ultra can-do with the mantra of 'We'll do it until we are told we can't'. With this in mind, the Autumn term was full of those things that make memories – House Fashion, House Art, the full array of House Sport, House Languages, the full programme of extra curricula activities, supporting the Soup Kitchen, Tea & Tours

for prospective parents, breakfasts to welcome Year 8 parents (who hadn't been into JCG since their daughter's induction evening in July 2020), Year 8 Buddy Baking (Year 7 to come next term), Art, Drama, English, Sport and Geography trips, the Walking Gallery exhibition at the Town Church, a disco for Year 7 & 8, a mountain of shoeboxes for Romania, the Cavell Auction, Lean In Diversity and Inclusion events, the Underwater Drone competition, our Remembrance Service (where we learnt about the JCG deportees), House Spirit Days, talks from Economists, White House staff and Data Scientists from NASA, the Colin Powell Student Peace Debate, 1:1 Careers interviews and visits from the Education Minister and the interim Director General of CYPES. We have held joint Year 7 PSHE lessons with VCJ, written a joint student charter, convened a joint

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student forum and had meetings with politicians to hear our students' experiences of women's safety in Jersey to shape future policy decisions. Our Year 7 made videos of their use of educational technology for Mr Howarth's presentation to 150 headteachers from China and our Head Girl led the College in the Amnesty 'Right to write' campaign. And on Saturday mornings, our Art School and our Foundation Creative Minds programmes (in Science, Drama and Computer Science) for Year 5 and 6 from across island schools continue to flourish. We staged our first production in two years, with the brilliant Beasts and Beauties, enjoyed our Carol Service with our soaring Chamber Choir and finished with House Dance – Top of the Pops. So yes, the term felt a little like normal.

But then again it didn't. Due to Covid, it was immensely challenging for many. Yet, our students and staff demonstrated incredible resilience in managing the DC process, having Covid, accessing Online learning, mask wearing throughout the College and having windows and external doors open all day, every day. And our parent body continued to show such solid support, encouragement and partnership – thank you; this is essential and makes the load lighter. We learnt to live like this, albeit reluctantly. As I said earlier, our students only have this one education and while it is easy to say 'It's too hard, we can't', the right and necessary thing is to say, 'It may be hard, let's see how we can.'

The overriding theme of the year is 'Coming Home'. As we emerged from the covid chrysalis and unfurled our rainbow wings, we, as a College, appreciated more than ever, that this very special place, not the building but the people, are our second home. It is a phrase you hear often and with deep sincerity from students and staff. It is also necessary. The death of Kezia in March took a notion of family and made it physically and emotionally real, all-encompassing and healing. The love, care and support shown for Kezia's family and for each other as we grieved a terrible loss was incredible. The Governing Body will never underestimate the capacity for love nor ever forget your gift of love to each other. Thank you.

The summer term burst with opportunities and very happy days. Our new Head girl team, Annabel, Head Girl, Chloe and Michaela, Deputy Head Girls, and the new student

leadership team hit the ground sprinting and have galvanised the whole of Year 12 to help bring College back to how we remember it; busy, fun and together. It has felt good to have our organisational muscle memory restored. It is also important to remember that many students and certainly our Year 7 through to Year 9 will not have experienced some events which are central to our culture.



Our Leavers Service for our Year 13 students is one of these events; poignant, happy, tearful and redolent of their feelings for their College. For our Year 7 – 9, this was their first Leavers Service and a wonderful occasion to hear Year 13 described how their time at College has shaped them into the remarkable people they are today. At this point I would like to say thank you to three very special people who led the student body throughout the year. Their compassion, ideas, care and constant encouragement was an inspiration to me and the whole College. They were simply wonderful. Thank you to Athena, Nikita, Kayleigh, our former and wonderful Head Girl team, and all Year 13 who left us in the summer. Their legacy remains.

It felt good to restore our Open Afternoon and welcome current and future parents into our College. So many visitors remarked on how they wished they could reverse time and come back to school. School at JCG is far more than great lessons. We have had resilience days led by the Army for Year 7, 8 and 10, Year 7 Maths roadshows, a Year 8 STEM challenge with Year 8 at VCJ, courses for our future Medics, Year 9 serving their community by cleaning beaches, Bronze DoE expeditions, field trips in Geography and Biology, trips to London for our Textile students, St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle for our Chamber Choir and a biodiversity expedition to Fiji, our business

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challenge for our future entrepreneurs, Art and Textile exhibitions, the Year 8 Shakespeare Festival (is there any other defining moment of Year 8?), Year 12 students running Maths workshops in primary schools, Year 10 story slams, students winning national competitions in table tennis, engineering, poetry and translation, 32 students achieving the highest of marks in their LAMDA exams, our uplifting Summer Concert, our brilliant House Fashion Show, our happy, warm and energetic Sports Day, our creation of a wishing tree to celebrate Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee, the remarkable 'Hell Heron' project for Year 9, the list could go on...

Four actions this year do need especial mention simply because they came directly from our students – the best ideas always do.

Our students lived out our desire for social activism. In holding a vigil for Aishling Murphy, in campaigning for free period products and petitioning the Government to bring into law the publication of gender pay gaps, they demonstrated their energy to challenge the norm and bring about better. The government listened and in regard to period products, responded.

The second action was the opening of a Multi-Faith room, the first of its kind in a Jersey school, following feedback from students that a place for quiet contemplation for people of faith would acknowledge the diversity and enhance inclusivity of our College. It is deliberately a very basic design and easily adaptable to the many different practices for which the space may be used. My thanks to Amal Ahmed in Year 11 and Mrs Briggs for turning an idea into reality.

The third action was our Festival of Cultures including our international food festival from 30 countries. Each food stall was presided over by a student from that country – a clear demonstration of the cultural diversity within our College. Students participated in a diverse range of over 20 workshops, each student led, ranging from Mathematical Culture, to the making of Pinatas, learning Welsh, or having a go at Hungarian dancing. My thanks to Aarya Patil in Year 11 for leading, designing and originating this brilliant day.

And the fourth action: four years ago, JCG students were finally permitted to join the CCF at Victoria College. Our students now outnumber the boys and the reason is that



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they simply love the opportunities and experiences that CCF gives them. At this year's promotion ceremony, we were delighted and very proud that Liberty Conway, then in Year 12, was announced as Contingent Senior Cadet and promoted to the rank of Company Sergeant Major.



At the end of November, JCG had its independent review as part of the Jersey Schools Review framework, the focus of which was on the quality of our provision during the pandemic, including the lockdown and since schools returned. The review concluded: 'the College is exceptional in its care for staff and morale and wellbeing is extremely well looked after, that relationships with all stakeholders are a strength of the College, that during the pandemic lockdown and since we returned the College has grown even more together as a community. Students are very positive about their teaching and learning and achievement has remained extremely high over the last three-years at GCSE and A level. Safeguarding is very effective.

Whilst I and the Governing Body felt that the College had done incredibly well during the pandemic and since, it was affirming to have an independent view acknowledging the 'impressive' quality of our provision and care.

Another measure of the deep vein of excellence running through the College was the sitting of exams and the results our students achieved. At A level, 57% of all grades were at A* / A and the average set of grades was AAB. At GCSE, 81% of all grades were grades 9 – 7 with the average set of grades being 5x 8 and 5 x 7, that's all A*s and As in the old currency. At a time when nationally we are seeing a reduction in the number of the highest grades, this is

a remarkable demonstration of sustained academic excellence. We are bucking the national trend. We are so proud of each of our students, staff and parents and the incredible partnership shown throughout this period. At times, life has been tough for each of us. However, the support and kindness given to one another was instrumental in reaching these new heights of personal success. More than any grades, it is this achievement of character that inspires me most.

Our JCG Foundation grows from strength to strength and I thank the Foundation members for their wise oversight and Peter, Philippa, Chen Min and Anastasia and all the Foundation staff for their creativity, vigour and success.

The Jersey College for Girls Foundation is a charitable trust whose sole purpose is to make excellent education available to as many students as possible.

Its key areas of focus are:

- Advancing the education of students at Jersey College for Girls and Jersey College for Girls Preparatory School.
- Widening access to the Schools through financial and other support, including in particular whole or part fee bursaries, to allow children, whose parents would otherwise be unable to afford the fees, to benefit from a JCG education.
- Advancing the education of students in Jersey or from other countries, through the organisation and funding of innovative educational courses and related activities at the Schools for their benefit.
- Leading the JCG alumnae community, creating a sustainable network of support and advocacy for the JCG Community and increasing the sense of belonging.

The Foundation's activities include:

- Little Leopards: an after-school play care provision for children in Reception to Year 6 from Jersey College Preparatory School.
- Creative Minds Camp and Programmes: holiday and Saturday programmes for Years 1 to 4 and 5 to 6 respectively, providing a range of fun and educational sessions, including STEM and creative activities
- Polyphony and LAMDA : in school music and speech & drama provision.



- Biomedical Leadership Programme: a Summer Programme for student considering, or curious about, a career in a biomedical field.
- LEAP: a Female Leadership Programme for international teams of students to develop business, entrepreneurial and leadership skills through launching social enterprise projects. This year we welcomed 25 students from Jersey and 25 students from Rwanda, USA, Austria, Taiwan and Turkey.
- Prepare: GCSE and A level intensive exam preparation at Easter.
- Immersion: the JCG Immersion Programme gives international students the opportunity to experience life in Jersey College for Girls and in the island of Jersey. Last year, six international students immersed themselves in the life of JCG and we look forward to a further six arriving shortly.



The Foundation is doing incredible work within and beyond JCG to advance the aspiration, ambition and achievement of our island's young people. The Foundation was also delighted to announce a further development and investment in the future of the College as we continue to widen its access to all who wish to join us.

Miss Isobel Stevenson, who was Headmistress of Jersey College for Girls from 1981 until 1994, left the Jersey College for Girls Foundation an incredibly generous bequest after she passed away at the beginning of the year.

Her bequest, a donation of £1.3 million, will allow the

Foundation to fund bursaries enabling a student to attend the College every year in perpetuity irrespective of their family's means. We are incredibly grateful for Miss Stevenson's generosity, a true reflection of her devotion and faith in the College.

Isobel was the College's greatest advocate and most staunchest defender. Formidable, forthright, yes, and also generous, kind and always possessing and driven by a deep hearted sense of care.

None of what I have reported would be possible without the dedication and ambition of our staff and students. JCG and JCP is a remarkable community, a partnership, a sheer delight to be part of and to be nourished by. I would like to thank every single member of this College in whatever role you fulfil for enabling us to provide the very best education of character for our students and our love and care for one another.

I thank Carl and Richard and their leadership teams, all our staff, students, fellow Governors and parents for your support, encouragement and perseverance. The Governing Body is so proud of everyone in our College family for how they have come together, united, full of love and care and determined to thrive. I also wish Richard every health and happiness as he retired from his role as Headteacher of JCP at the end of the academic year.

As we look forward to the forthcoming year, our focus is to continue to strengthen our wellbeing. To be active, to keep learning, to give of ourselves for the benefit of others, to connect, to take notice, to care. We will be led by the science in fashioning our strategy, we will become a biophilic campus, will continue to challenge discrimination and be activists for a better world. But most of all, we will take care of each other for if we achieve what I know we are capable of achieving, we will astound ourselves.

Competitions

During the year, JCP pupils and JCG students entered competitions covering a wide range of curriculum areas. Here are some highlights:

JCP

Bebras Challenge

Years 2 to 6 took part in the Bebras challenge - an online computational thinking challenge. Everyone who participated was awarded a certificate and then they were graded against their school peers for 'merit', 'distinction' or 'best in school' in each age group category. Years 2-3 (kits), Years 4-5 (castors) and Year 6 (juniors).

Eisteddfod

A number of children were entered in this year's Art and Craft Eisteddfod.

We had a beautiful array of Needlework from Year 6 and a fantastic range of both 2D and 3D art, ranging from Reception age students all the way up to Year 6!

In total we received the following certificates:

- 6 Platinum
- 12 Gold
- 24 Silver and
- 1 Bronze.

A special mention to Jessica C (Year 4), who was awarded the Jenny Gill trophy for the best overall piece entered in the Primary art section! A wonderful achievement.

Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition

Pupils took part in the Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition, the oldest and largest youth writing contest in the world. The 2021 Competition had more than 25,000

entries with 26 awards going to our pupils from Year 6 last year.

Sport

Children from years 4-6 took part in many sporting events off-site last year. These included: 2 football festivals; 2 cross country events; a tag rugby festival; weekly netball fixtures; 2 netball tournaments; a hockey tournament, the swimarathon; weekly cricket fixtures; the athletics championships. A wide variety of children took part in these events.



In both November 2021 and February 2022, Florence W won the year 5 girls primary school cross country competition (in a field of 230 competitors). This was a fantastic achievement, one which hasn't been accomplished by a pupil from JCP since 2013. The year 5 children also won the team trophy on both occasions, thanks to excellent performances from Florence W, Bethany S and Niamh C.

Children from JCP also tasted success in the summer, as some of them were selected to take part in the primary school athletics championships. Florence W and Matilda H became Jersey champions in the U11 600m and high jump competitions respectively, with Florence equaling the all-time Jersey record in her event. Daisy F became Jersey

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champion in the U12 long jump competition. Florence W, Amalie M and Kitty O became Jersey runners-up in the U11 hurdles, high jump and sprint competitions respectively. Annabel S became Jersey runner-up in the U12 long jump competition. It was a fantastic event, and the children from JCP represented the school extremely well.

JCP also joined forces with VCP in a mixed tag rugby tournament, and despite having never played together, the team managed to win the whole tournament, which was played on the Jersey Red home pitch - an occasion which they thoroughly enjoyed.

JCP won a fundraising trophy for the Swimathon - the children and their families raised the most money of any of the schools that took part in the event - a staggering £2,800 from 64 participants. Year 6 Sports Leaders attended a presentation in which they collected a trophy on behalf of the school. The trophy was presented by the Lions Club of Jersey to the school that raised the most amount of money per person at this year's Swimathon. Well done to all the children who took part, and their families for their fundraising efforts

Music

At the music Eisteddfod in November 2021, notable music results were Madeleine H and Prutha T who won gold in the under 11 vocal class. Prutha also won the Galiya Oguniesi trophy in the string class and Jessica L won her class and a gold certificate in another string class. Mia L-S won a piano class and a gold certificate.

Christmas 2021 celebrations included Reception who performed the "The Higgledy Piggledy Nativity", year 2 performed "The Angel Who Nearly Missed It All!"



The Carol Service took place at St Mary and St Peter Catholic church and was attended by pupils in years 3 – 6.

It was not possible for a live audience to be present due to Covid restrictions, so the service was filmed and the recording shared with parents.

House Music events took place online during in the Spring term and Le Sueur were the winning house. Some notable performances were Prutha with her singing and piano, Amalia on the violin, Rose on the clarinet, Sophia Rose on the piano and Freya on the flute. The Orchestra, Strings ensemble, Choirs and section winners of House Music performed at the Spring concert for Open Day in April 2021.

During the summer term Year 4 participated in a Music in Action event "Music Across the Bay. The annual Year 6 production took place in June 2022 and was 'Hoodwinked', an adaptation of the story of Robin Hood. The performance was a huge success the singing was of the usual high standard.

The number of children learning a musical instruments remains strong, we currently have 86 pupils in Key Stage 2 receiving weekly lessons through Polyphony or the Jersey Music Service.

JCG

English

The House Poetry Competition had school-wide participation has created leadership opportunities for year 12 English Literature students. The junior entries were incredibly strong this year, leading to additional prizes and commendations.

Some students were inspired to enter further competitions independently. Once again, a student's work has been recognised in the international competition Never Such Innocence: Caitlin Green was given an Honourable Mention in the 11-14 category.

Creative writing club continues to attract a lot of students; our writers were passionate about sharing their work publicly through the creative writing exhibition.

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JCG students produced some incredible work for this year's Festival of Words Writing Competition, covering all three categories: flash fiction, short stories and poetry. The winners had their work printed in a special supplement in the JEP:

Humanities

In History 4 Year 13 students attended the annual Baccata lecture by Professor Julian Jackson on 'Charles de Gaulle and Brexit' and Siena Mawby submitted a highly commended piece in the Schools History Project essay competition. Politics students met with Lord Borwick and discussed the reform of the Lords, the role of a peer, the extent to which the House of Lords is representative and the impact of Brexit.

In Religious Studies, eight year 10/11 students participated in the Colin Powell Rotary Club Peace debate (four participated, the other four observed but helped plan the debate.) JCG came second. Two of the girls from the team Aarya Patil and Anna Kassai were invited to the Rotary Club Annual Dinner. The two students gave a speech about their experience at the peace debate and how they have found this a helpful experience. Four Year 12 students developed their awareness of current affairs in the Jersey Youth Assembly and spoke on BBC Radio about the issue facing young voters. All Year 7 students entered the Spirited Arts

competition. These were judged in school, and 8 finalists were sent off to the national competition. We are awaiting the results. Four students were interviewed by BBC radio about creating the first multi-faith prayer room in Jersey schools. This has had a knock on effect around the island with a number of schools now wanting to create their own room for prayers/contemplation.

Geography students conducted fieldwork at Plemont (Year 8), Bouley Bay (Year 10-11) and Le Braye and St Helier (Year 12). Natasha Day (Jersey States Planning Officer) and Jamie Moss (Shoreline Management Plan) came to speak to Year 12.

Modern Languages

Oxford University Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators:

Jessica Palfreyman, Year 12, was regional winner of the Italian section for the South-West with her creative translation of a piece of Italian prose. She progressed to the national final and was selected as national runner-up.

Lucy Chambers in Year 12 was successful in gaining a place on the Jeunesse et Développement volunteering trip offered by Jersey Overseas Aid. She spent 3 weeks undertaking volunteer work in Sénégal.

Maths

Nikita Handel and Amelie Turpin both submitted excellent essays for the national "Tom Rocks Maths" Essay Competition based at St. Edmund's Hall, Oxford. Amelie's essay looked at Chaos Theory through the lens of the Logistics Map, and Nikita's (which made the winners' shortlist) looked at some ideas in Knot Theory applied to baking chocolate babka.

Poppy Mallett (8CA) won a prize and a certificate of merit for her solutions to 8 problems set in the Southampton Maths Challenge over Easter.

In Computer Science all students from Years 7-10 entered the Bebras Challenge. 43 students scored in the top 10% of UK students and so qualified for, and took part in, the Oxford University Computing Challenge.

Science

A team of Year 9 students, built and raced an underwater Remote Operated Vehicle (ROV), as part of the Ports of Jersey SeaPerch competition against other Jersey Schools. This led to interested and engaged students who are keen on further study and careers in STEM.

Austin-Barlett won the House Science Competition to fundraise, build and race remote-controlled cars against other teams, which involved students from all year groups. This three-week event had a wide range of students working in teams to explore Science beyond the curriculum.

Ten Year 12 students entered the Chemistry Olympiad: two achieved Bronze Awards.

'Think Like a Scientist' Science Roadshow delivered to six local primary schools. In addition to performing demonstrations with a 'wowfactor', this gave approximately 200 Year 5 and 6 students an insight into science, and into the scientific equipment used in secondary schools. A similar show was also given to one primary school aimed at 100 Year 1 and 2 students, themed around light, to fit in with their school Science Week.



Creativity & Performance

Food & Nutrition

Buddy Baking

Ongoing Covid-19 restrictions temporarily interrupted the Buddy Baking House competition, which should have taken place with Yr 12 students and their Yr 7 buddies in May last year. Not to be deterred, we found a solution to the problem and reinstated two heats of this popular House event.

The overall standard was very high in the second heat. Curie Fry were eventually awarded the trophy for the best tasting cakes, whilst Nightingale House won the creativity award for their wonderful creations.



Collaborative PSHE lessons with Victoria College The Year 7 joint PSHE lessons in Food & Nutrition have been a huge success. The boys and girls have worked collaboratively to make a simple snack using dried dates, oats, coconut, honey and plain chocolate. It was very obvious that there's nothing quite like working with chocolate to break down any perceived gender barriers. From the very beginning, all students were communicating with one another and working effectively together. We're sure these collaborative skills will stay with them as they continue to develop a mutual respect and understanding for each other outside of the classroom.

The Shelter Trust for the Homeless Soup Kitchen

On the 7th of December 2021, students went down to the Royal Square with buckets of soup prepared by Year 10. They said everybody had been really friendly and described it as a great experience helping out the community. They were also pleased to know they had helped the Shelter Trust raise almost £15,000 for homeless people in Jersey.

Design & Technology

Arkwright Scholarship

Annabel Mair successfully passed the 2021 application process to be awarded a prestigious Arkwright Engineering Scholarship. She will be sponsored by JT Global during her sixth form studies and is intending to apply for a Civil Engineering degree next year.

Annabel's innovative design for a medicine dispenser gives the user their correct dose of medication simultaneously with a shot of water.



Association of Jersey Architects' 'Design a 'Parklet' competition

A team of Year 8 students from the DT Friday Lunchtime Club entered the local design a parklet competition. Poppy Mallett, Elizabeth Cunningham, Annabel de Vuelle, Bella Robertson chose the theme of Eco-friendly Jersey.

Their idea for the parklet was to offer a small oasis of the countryside in a common urban area, one parking space.

The team won the 'Best use of Recycled Materials and Planting' category of the competition with their design and were awarded voucher prizes by sponsors Romerils Ltd. with a shot of water.

Art

Hell Heron

In July, the Creative faculty led other Faculties on a six-day project called Hell Heron after the recent discovery of this dinosaur. The whole of Year 9 looked at evolution

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and what makes us human. Each day was hosted by a different faculty with the support of five Jersey artists. The first day at the zoo, the Maths Faculty got the students to measure dinosaur footprints. Students also learned about genetics with lego families and natural selection by collecting coloured worms. At La Hougue Bie, the History Faculty explored the Occupation, as well as the natural geology of Jersey and how humans had gone from hunter gatherers to farming communities. At the War Tunnels, the English Faculty explored war poetry and the art of the visual structures of the occupation. Returning to the zoo, the Science Department invited Doctor Gostling, who was part of the team who discovered the Hell Heron. It was an amazing opportunity for the pupils to ask questions from a world renowned expert. On that day, the Modern Foreign Languages also explored how humans and animals communicate.



Saturday Art School The Saturday Arts school is run at JCG for all local students aged 11 to 18. It is taught by artists and teachers and allows pupils to explore ways of working at Degree level. Students from Le Roquier, Grainville, Haute Vallee, Highlands, Hautlieu, La Passerelle as well as home-schooled pupils have taken part. We have guaranteed funding for this course working with Art House Jersey for the next three years and the Art School is free to students.

Artwork for JAAR offices

Students from the Art elective designed abstract work that used colour theory therapeutically. Some of the work was exhibited in Voisens and sold to raise £700 for Jersey

Action Against Rape (JAAR).

Inspiring Jersey Women's Book

The Art department worked with the Soroptimists and author Penny Bryne to run a whole island workshop for art students to illustrate a page in a book about local inspiring women. Several pages in the final publication were created by JCG students.



Standard Chartered Competition

Artwork created by Annabel Bryan-Orr was picked by Standard Chartered to decorate their office and be included in their wider art collection, which also includes renowned artists such as Rachael Whiteread.

Eisteddfod

Phoebe Wild (Year 7) won the Sue Chinn award. Kimberly Reddy (Year 12) won two trophies for her photography, The De La Salle Young Photographers Trophy and the John Le Boutilier Memorial Trophy.

House Art

House Art celebrated the work of students across Key Stage 3, 4 and 5, including work from art, photography and textiles.

The overall winners were Austen-Bartlett, with Garrett-Anderson and Curie Fry coming second and third respectively. Hannah George from Nightingale received the award for 'Best overall piece of art'. In Key Stage 3, Hannah Moulson from Austen Bartlett won, while Laila Wycherley (Garrett Anderson) and Lucy Woodward (Curie Fry) won in Key Stage 4 and 5 respectively.

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Music

Finally, Music was allowed to return. After three years when very little was permitted, we were thrilled to be able to hold a Carol service, House Music, a Spring and Summer term concert, and even go out and perform at Windsor Castle.

For the students having House Music back meant a great deal. The combination of interhouse competitiveness, and music, which they all enjoy galvanised the whole community. With the exception of House Choir, every element of House Music was allowed to return, and the competitive spirit meant that the whole College was alive with rehearsals happening in every nook and cranny.

together with the winning house from House Music. The concert was a mixture of House Music soloists and our main ensembles, so it was enormously varied, and highlighted the talent we have in both the senior and junior parts of the College, so it really felt that normal life was returning.

As restrictions relaxed we were able to visit Diva Opera, and a group of our sixth form singers made a video for Womens' Refuge, which is so important in Jersey. In the summer the Chapel Choir performed Evensong at St George's Windsor. This was a real thrill for all the choir. Getting out to perform is a crucial part of music making, and of keeping our students encouraged to keep their music up. Such was the reference from Windsor, that we have now booked Westminster Abbey for 2 performances this coming year.

Drama

Drama Captains and Year 7 Drama Club

Our Drama Captains for the year were Eleanor Bayford and Hannah Bird. They were a fantastic team and contributed tirelessly to all aspects of Drama at JCG while in the role. Both took an active part in the school production with Eleanor choreographing the physical movement of the play, Hannah and Eleanor taking lead roles and Hannah helping with publicity. On top of this Autumn Term commitment, they also established a highly successful Year 7 Drama Club, with a really massive number of students attending each week.

JCG Youth Theatre - Beasts and Beauties

For the first time since the pandemic we were able to stage a full school show in 2021. The plan had been to do a musical but this was not possible due to ongoing restrictions on group singing in schools. We therefore had to search quickly for a play alternative and read several scripts before deciding on the ensemble piece 'Beasts and Beauties' by Carol Ann Duffy and Tim Supple.

We had a great turnout at auditions and ended up with a cast of 35, plus a regular Tech Club of about the same. The play is a series of old legends and fairy stories and we tried to modernise it by exploring what it really means to be beautiful. The set was full of mirrors to convey the dangers of vanity and we used a very edgy and modern style with up to the minute music choices and projected words to make the audience reflect on the theme.

The play was a really uplifting end to the Christmas Term and we were immensely proud of all of our cast and crew, none of whom succumbed to the dreaded Covid in show week!



We were also honoured to perform an excerpt from Beasts and Beauties in the Commemoration for Kezia. She had

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been a member of our cast. Her central position in our promotional photoshoot was displayed on the screen for all to see.

LAMDA

Numbers for LAMDA were up again in 2021/22 and results were excellent once again. In the summer of 2021 all JCG students attained Distinction in their LAMDA exams so that was an exceptional year. However, we attained very similar scores in the summer of 2022 with 25 attaining Distinction and 7 Merit. The students were helped extensively by Miss Stirk, Miss Le Brun and Mrs Stone and both Drama Captains and Junior Drama Prefects helped with the LAMDA administrative process. The students were all over the moon with their results and so were we.



Textiles

Workshops with Eliza Anna Reine

One of the benefits of Covid 19 was the use of online learning through platforms such as Zoom and Microsoft teams. Eliza Anna Reine is an artist who is based in Latvia and Jersey. Eliza's artworks celebrate femininity in vibrant colour combinations. Her collages collectively represent many different facets of womanhood and have been described as 'an ode to the female'.

She ran her workshop via Zoom from Latvia, with excellent results from the Year 11 Textile students! They had a wonderful time.

Slow Fashion Initiative

The Eco captains and Mrs Padidar brought a new eco initiative to the College by holding a JCG clothes swap. It was a huge success. The event started with 45 bags of unwanted clothes reduced to 4 bags. This was a fantastic and great way to reduce waste and it raised £168 for 'Friends of the earth'.

Trips

Year 12 Textile students got the opportunity to enjoy a two-day trip to London. They visited the Tate Modern and the V&A Museum where they saw some inspiring exhibitions such as 'Fashioning Masculinities'. These exhibitions are vital for the students to take inspiration from and come up with unique ideas and concepts for their own personal investigations.

Junk Kouture

Year 12 textile students were selected for the Junk Kouture Competition out of thousands of entries from across England and Scotland. Junk Kouture is a sustainable fashion competition in which students are invited to model haute-couture designs made entirely from recycled materials. The team behind 'Mind Pollution', Anna, Bonnie and Charlotte, were so successful that they were one of the 10 designs that were selected by the Junk Kouture judging during the London City Final to compete with 50 other designs for the world competition in Abu Dhabi in January.

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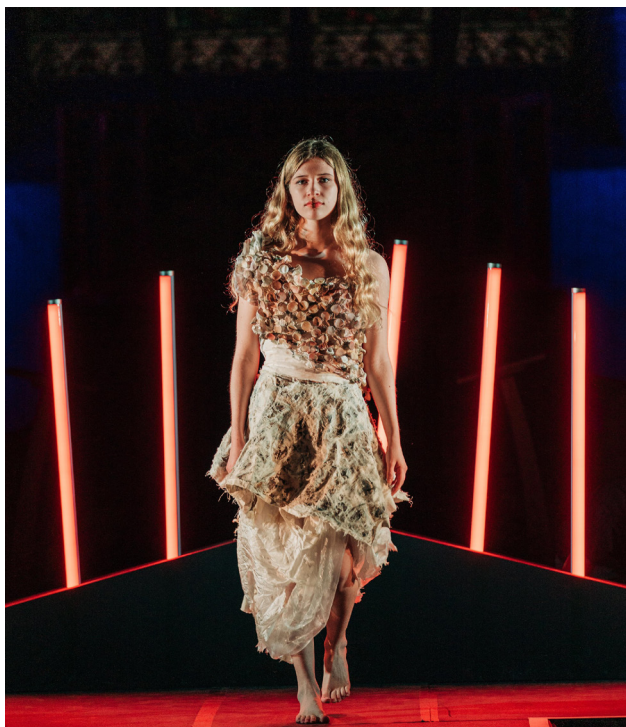
received Gold and Platinum certificates for their pieces.

Established in 2010, Young Fashion Designer UK is an exciting national competition which focuses on enhancing the talent of students to showcase and promote the exceptional work achieved at GCSE, A level and by students aged 11-14 studying textiles design, product design and fashion throughout the United Kingdom.

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PE

Sports Ambassador

JCP Educational Visits

Reception

Reception had a morning at La Rocque Beach to find out about rockpools and build sand castles in July.

Each class also went swimming for 10 weeks with Le Mourier Swim School.

In February Reception were visited by the Jersey Fire and Rescue Service and they taught us how to stay safe in the event of a fire and how to make an emergency call.

Year 1

Year 1 went to Hamptonne Woods to look at the changes of autumn in October making wonderful patterns with natural materials found during the day.

They went to Mont Orgueil Castle as part of their castle topic in the spring term investigating the parts of a castle and how its inhabitants would defend themselves against attack!

In the summer term Year 1 had a Pirate Day at school dressing up and taking part in pirate themed activities such as singing sea shanties, playing pirate games and having a pirate picnic.

Year 2

In the summer term, Year 2 were explorers and visited the local meadow to hunt for plants and bugs and even pond dipped!

Year 3

Year 3 visited Hamptonne woods to make fairy gardens in the Autumn term.

A great day investigating rock formation and learning how sea levels have changed was had at Ronez Quarry.

Kaz Padidar led a wonderful day for the Year 3 girls at Les Mielles, the girls studied bushcraft and learnt all about edible plants.

Year 4

Year 4 had a term of 'Jersey Studies' (Jerriais) where we learnt about the history of our island, language and culture as well as some interesting legends related to La Hougue Bie.

At La Hougue Bie, Year 4 worked on sharpening axes; grinding corn to make flour using real Neolithic querns; as well as visiting the passage grave - it was very dark and very damp! We also produced a 'Stone Age' timeline using PowerPoint as part of our computing curriculum.

Year 4 were also able to visit Mont Orgeuil in the summer term as a culmination to our Norman topic where we learnt all about 1204 and the decision Jersey made to stay loyal to the English crown.

Year 5

As part of their Victorian topic in the Autumn term Year 5 visited St Helier town tour and a visit Le Moulin de Quetivel

In the Spring term Year 5 visited The States Chamber and debated the issue of banning single use plastic in Jersey at the States Chamber. Each pupil spoke with clarity and confidence as well as persuading some members to change their initial opinions. Year 5 had their first residential in the Scout Centre during the Spring term, learning about weaving as part of their Aztec topic and explored the local area.
