The Chair's Report

This past year can be easily divided into two halves with the pivot being 20 March. I find I have to think hard to remember all that the College achieved before this date.

That is perhaps because so much unexpected, unfamiliar and unwanted change has happened to each of us since then. So much has been untimely ripped from us, from being able to see and hua loved ones to our students showing our efforts and abilities in exams to postponing much anticipated and much-loved events for both our youngest and oldest students. However, throughout this year the College community has always shown great ambition and aspiration, courage and resilience. And most importantly, our students and staff at both JCG and JCP have constantly been there for one another, for their college, their community, with care, encouragement, time and support. The view of the Governors is that the entire College community has been amazing. This year has brought out the best in each of us and each of us make this unique

place called Jersey College. That sense of belonging, which we so often refer to and rely upon, has never been stronger than now. 2020 has been a very special year.

I would like to refer back to a time when we didn't know what Coronavirus was, never talked about social distancing, could never imagine a lockdown.

Our academic year began with great energy and a little nervousness; we knew at some point that term that JCG was likely to inspected and that JCP most definitely would be inspected, albeit in different ways.

In November JCG became the first school in Jersey to be officially externally reviewed by the Government under its new framework. As anyone will know when an external team is in looking at everything, it is not without its stresses.

However, the Senior Leadership Team were very keen to ensure the students and staff just carried on as if it were a normal week. Essentially to relax and be themselves. The Governors are immensely proud of what our team, and by that I include all our students, staff, and parents, worked so hard to achieve; 'Outstanding' in every category. One of my favourite phrases in the report and one that I think sums up the College I see every day is that JCG is a 'happy and high performing school'. These two qualities are sometimes interpreted by people as binary opposites, that you can't be caring and at the same time be academically high achieving. This is, of course, absolute rubbish. Our students are remarkable because of the care and support around them - on the good days and the not so good days. Another phrase in the report referred to our JCG culture, 'the school is encompassed in one of its values: belong. Everyone is part of a shared endeavour'. And finally, a description which delighted the Governors was that our students are 'highly mature and sensitive to others. They are polite, kind, positive, caring and confident without being over confident'. This is the most important quality indicator of all in a successful education; to be a good person with the ability to do good: it's all about our character. In the meantime. JCP had a full Curriculum Review at the end of which the Lead Reviewer, a seasoned HMI, declared 'If I had a child of primary age, this is the sort of school I would like them to come to'.

JCG was innovating in the Autumn term. Curie-Fry won a revamped House Drama which included some hilarious spontaneous improvisation. Garrett Anderson won Senior and Inglis won Junior Top of the Pops. Our new head of Music, Mr Bowley, launched our Music Café which offered performance opportunities for our students and open to the public. Our students designed, made and modelled fashion made out of rubbish to highlight the environmental damage of the fast fashion industry, our House Fashion event was simply incredible with its creativity and polish. We were becoming a College of social activism; we spoke at the Commonwealth Women's Parliamentary Conference, became the first secondary

school in the Channel Islands to be awarded Silver status as a Rights Respecting school and our students honed their rhetoric in debates and mock general elections.

And in December, we all discovered our inner cowgirl in the form of Calamity Jane; thank you for a truly remarkable, exuberant production. At JCP, the outstanding writing across the school was rewarded in gaining a total of fourteen awards in the annual Commonwealth Essay competition which accounted for more than forty percent of all awards across the island.

The Spring term began with real promise and expectation and familiar service to our community. We received permission to build a bridge over Claremont Road thus physically and safely connecting JCG with JCP, funding for our new Music Centre and extension to the Hall was included in the Government Plan, our sixth formers had won the regional round of a national mock law trial competition and were on their way to the national final and JCG won the Colin Powell Rotary Club peace debate. Collectively, the College raised a significant sum of money for Australian charities who were fighting those dreadful fires and the immense loss of wildlife.

Our Year 8 planted 1000 saplings and our Sixth Form were spectacular in raising funds for our partner school in Ghana

House Music was gearing up to be an incredible year and each and every House, in both schools, believed they had a chance to take Cock House Cup or The House Cup in JCG and JCP respectively. Everyone was working hard in their lessons and our Year 6, GCSE and A level students were demonstrating the work ethic required for great exam success. Term was going well on both sides of Claremont Road.

Then a new reality emerged on our horizon to the east. News of something in China and spreading across Europe began to pepper our conversations. It was new but nothing to worry about. Life carried on. Yet this thing moved towards us like a sea mist. We could see it coming though had no idea what it would be like until it settled upon all of us.



We were told we would be closing. No House Music, no Cock House. No Year 11 Prom. No Yr6 French trip. No Leavers Service. We were told exams and SAT's were being cancelled. We were told we all had to lockdown in our homes.

Yet, in the midst of chaos and worry, examples of human kindness were in abundance. The actions and ideas of our students can only be described as magnificent. The Governors recognised the challenge met by staff as they had to adapt quickly and become experts in teaching remotely and learning from home. We launched JCGTV. Across the 'virtual' College, groups came together when they couldn't actually be together and in doing so boosted their positivity and belonging. Teachers across the whole College received many personal cards and emails from their students and parents alike simply saying Thank You. Not only did the College move online, we moved out into our community and the Jersey College

network sprang into action. The Governors are immensely grateful to those who shopped for elderly neighbours, volunteered in our parishes, became health workers, drivers, film-makers, choir members. Year 8 created, whilst in lockdown, an incredible and poignant exhibition for Liberation 75 whilst JCP designed and made Liberation leaflets for Community parties. Our sixth formers ran 600km, the distance form Jersey's Nightingale Hospital to the one in London and in doing so raised £8000 for two local charities, as all pupils and staff maintained their commitment to run 1k every Wednesday throughout. Without doubt, all at Jersey College learnt new skills and we all learnt to appreciate even more our beautiful island.

And when we could, we were delighted to reopen the College. Our students and teachers resumed lessons, the College welcomed the new student leadership team and thanked the immense commitment and success of the retiring team. The College also reflected on our

lockdown experiences in words, photos and paintings. The Governors are deeply grateful to the sensitive, and compassionate response to the death of George Floyd and the Black Lives Matter movement.

The Governors were delighted to be informed that the College loved being back together to talk, to learn, to challenge, to think, to seek to do everything we can to prepare ourselves to make the world better.

We have all been through a year that is, without exaggeration, historic. As Chair of Governors I remain incredibly proud of all the staff and students.

Above everything else, it is one's character which matters most. While this year has taken much from us it has also given us even more. It has not left us weaker but stronger, closer, more ambitious and more aware of the importance of kindness, generosity of spirit, of the value of friendship, and of knowing that as a College when we believe we can, we will.

Looking forward to 2020/21, our priorities for the entire College are clear. The first of these is the wellbeing of our children and ensuring no child suffers a loss of learning or a slowing of progress due to the lockdown. This is especially important for our students approaching their GCSEs or A levels. The Governors are deeply appreciative of the efforts of the staff to ensure this will not happen and we are confident that every student will be ready and prepared.

We look forward to engaging with the Government in the shaping and delivery of the Education Reform Programme. Our aspiration is that this will result in greater autonomy for the College and a 'fit-for-purpose' funding agreement. Having secured funding in the new Government Plan, we hope to start the building of the Music Centre, an archaeological assessment of the field and extension of our College Hall. We have gained planning permission for our bridge over Claremont Road and hope to see this project concluded.

The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic has had a significant financial impact upon many of our families. We will continue to invest in our bursary programme to support our families and do all we can to ensure a young person's education is not affected.

And finally, we are excited about launching our new fouryear strategy in the New Year entitled 'Believe You Can'. This strategy sets out our ambitions and direction and underlines our unrelenting determination to provide the very best educational provision for our students and staff.

On behalf of the Governors, I would like to thank our parents for their continuous messages of support and encouragement throughout this year. Most importantly, I commend our College leadership, our staff and our young people for their magnificent efforts and resilience throughout this most challenging of years.
